We want our students not just to acquire knowledge and skills but also to become more independent and selfdirected in their learning and our work this term has supported these aims. It was fantastic to see so many parents and carers attend our Year 10 and Year 8 student progress meetings this half term. These were incredibly useful opportunities to discuss and work together to ensure that students are fully supported to succeed and thrive.

Last week I took time every day to visit lessons to talk to students about what they were learning, how they were finding their lessons and what their next steps were. I was delighted to witness some truly engaging learning experiences with plenty of hard work and focus. STEM Outreach Day at 3M



On the 8th of March, a group of 10 students were able to go to a Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) Outreach day sponsored by the Royal Academy of Engineering. The students were awarded a place on the trip by writing a letter which described their interest in engineering-related careers. We had nine year 9 students and one year 7 student who attended.

The students were put in groups with students from other schools and rotated

through three different activities. The first activity was an opportunity to interview various employees of 3M and learn more about the company and the skills needed to be successful in engineering. The second activity was a selection of problem-solving activities including an escape room challenge, geometrical problem-solving, and the construction of a tower that could support the weight of a Cadbury Egg. Our students were very successful in these and a group, which had two of our students, even set a new record for the 3M Escape Room!

The last activity was a tour of the 3M Innovation Centre in which the students were able to learn about all the products that 3M designs and the inspiration that led to them. The guides emphasized the importance of experimenting and looking for new ways to solve problems.

Overall, we had an excellent day learning about an innovative company that strives to find new ways to solve problems each day. The students enjoyed the opportunity to see how STEM subjects can be applied in real life and everyone left feeling ready to participate in Engineering Challenges back at school.



Gold Programme

Year 9

On February 11th, two engineers from a local engineering firm, Peter Brett Associates, came in to run an engineering information session for our year 9 Gold Programme Students. The session included both an information session on engineering and the

different branches of engineering as well as a practical task. The students learned about transport and civil engineering which are two branches that Peter Brett Associates focus on. The students also learned about the different ways to become an engineer; the apprenticeship route or the university route. They looked at

the characteristics of different buildings and then, using those principles, constructed a

slender tower that could withstand wind force and be as tall as possible without having a wide base. The strength of their towers was tested using stacks of book and the winning tower was able to hold three books. The students enjoyed the session greatly and left with some new ideas about apprenticeships and engineering.









Year 10

On March 14th, two engineers from a local engineering firm, Peter Brett Associates, came in to run an engineering information session for our year 10 Gold Programme Students. The session included both an information session on engineering and the different branches of engineering as well as a practical challenge. The students learned about transport and civil engineering which are two branches that Peter Brett Associates focus on. They also learned how engineers design buildings to evenly distribute the weight of the building and support it equally. Using the principles of engineering that were shared, the students were able to design some excellent buildings that were not only interesting architecturally, but also were structurally sound. The students learned about the different ways to become an engineer, the apprenticeship route or the university route. They were able to change some preconceived notions about apprenticeship options and ask questions about summer job placements and ways that they can build their resumes before applying for apprenticeships or A-levels. The session was enjoyable for all and the engineers left very impressed with our students here at Maiden Erlegh School in Reading.

Morton ether inhaler

A replica of the ether inhaler used by William Thomas Green Morton in the first public demonstration of ether as surgical anaesthesia at Massachusetts General Hospital on October 16 1846. The glass sphere contains an ether-soaked sponge that the patient would inhale through the mouthpiece.

Ether was a second stage in the development of effective anaesthetics. In 1847 Robert Liston used ether in London when he successfully amputated a patients leg. However ether did have its drawbacks. Not only did it cause irritation of the eyes and lungs but it also caused coughing and sickness.
