



Reading Youth Cabinet

Reading Youth Cabinet are a group of elected representatives for the young people of Reading, who campaign on issues that have been highlighted both locally and nationally. We also make a difference by voicing the opinions of young people to the decision makers.

Some of the things we do, include:

- Taking part in planning, delivering and evaluating services for young people
- Consulting, meeting and influencing decision makers
- Consulting with young people
- Promoting positive images of young people
- Campaigning for the important issues for young people in Reading

The Youth Cabinet also works with the Local Safeguarding Children Board (LSCB), the UK Youth Parliament (UKYP), the Young Inspectors and Children-in-Care Council, senior managers and Councillor's and voluntary groups and the community.

The Reading Youth Cabinet meets up every other Tuesday at the Civic Offices, starting at 4.30pm and finishing at 6.30pm. This is the group that develops and works on local campaigns and also supports the work of the UK Youth Parliament's national campaigns.

The meetings are run by the young people on the Youth Cabinet. We decide what we are going to talk about; this could be about our campaign work or issues affecting young people. The cabinet decide who to invite to our meetings and who we would like to meet. This could be people like Councillors and MPs, and people who work with young people.

Currently, we are working on three campaigns which have

been voted as the most important problems within our community. The campaigns are: knife crime, homelessness and mental health. We will be working on these campaigns until march of 2020, where we will deliver our campaigns to schools, MPs , social workers, and many more. The Reading Youth Cabinet maintain an important role within our community, as it provides the youth of Reading a say on important issues. Within our youth council, I represent both Maiden Erlegh School in Reading, and represent the youth of Reading.

The girls were able to listen to several Microsoft employees discuss how technology has helped to make the world



Maiden Erlegh School in Reading wins award for Young Carer support

Maiden Erlegh School in Reading has parent been given an award for their work to who ha make sure students don't miss out on an education because they are young carers. The Young Carers in Schools

The Young Carers in Schools programme helps primary and secondary schools improve outcomes for young carers and celebrates good practice through the Young Carers in Schools Award. They commented:

"To achieve their Bronze Award Maiden Erlegh School in Reading has demonstrated that it supports young carers in many ways, including homework clubs and drop-in sessions with a member of staff who is responsible for this vulnerable group of pupils. Vital information about how to identify young carers is made available to all school staff, and noticeboards and the school webpage let students and their families know where to go for help".

Mr Johnson, Headteacher, said in response to receiving the award,

"As an inclusive school we strive to know and support all our students and understanding the lives they live in and outside of school. Young carers in our school face particular challenges and I am very proud of the way that our school acknowledges and supports them. This award is well deserved and is an acknowledgement of the tireless work of many of our staff in ensuring our school is a positive and supportive environment".

Young carers are responsible for emotional, practical or physical care for a

parent, sibling or other family member who has a physical disability, mental health issue or substance misuse issue. The 2011 Census statistics

revealed that there are just over 166,000 young carers in England, but research reveals that this is just the tip of the iceberg. The true figure could be closer to 700,000 young carers in England, equivalent to one in 12 school

children many of whom are unrecognised and unsupported.

Research carried out by Carers Trust and The Children's Society shows that, on average, young carers miss or cut short 48 school days a year and often have lower levels of self-confidence, mental wellbeing and significantly lower educational attainment at GCSE level, because of their caring role. Ofsted's Common Inspection Framework states that inspectors will look at how well schools support young carers. While some schools are doing this really well, others struggle and this causes real problems for young carers.

To help schools support young carers, the <u>www.youngcarersinschools.com</u> programme offers a step-by-step guide for leaders, teachers and non-teaching staff, with practical tools designed to make it as easy as possible for schools. Staff can also receive training through webinars and events and the programme also features a newsletter each term highlighting relevant policy developments, spotlighting good practice and giving updates on the programme's successes.

Keeping our children safe from drowning

Each year children in the UK die or sustain life changing injuries in and around water that could have been prevented. Every year a teenager in Berkshire dies from drowning.

accessing a piece of water that is not safe please contact the police. Alternatively, you can contact school and we will pass submit an intelligence report to the police on your behalf.

Starpack Schools Awards 2019

The Starpack Packaging Design Competition is a national competition for schools and colleges from all over the country to work to a design brief set by industry professionals. The Schools Starpack Packaging Awards are designed to encourage students to take up a career in the exciting world of consumer packaging design. The competition fits well into our KS4 curriculum and gives students a chance to use the iterative design process and work to real deadlines.

All of my Year 9 Technology students took part in the competition and had to research, design, develop and make a product from a set brief set by industry. The project was run as a mini GCSE and the best submissions were entered for the competition. The range and quality of the projects was very high and I entered thirteen students for their work to be judged. After a nervous wait, we were delighted to hear the news that we had been successful. All thirteen students received a certificate of entry. However, some students won additional awards.

The overall theme was about sustainability and responsible packaging, which is a very topical subject. Christina and Nouman won Silver for their re-usable water bottle. Helene won a 'Highly Commended Award and best portfolio also in this category. Eliza won a Silver and 'Best Portfolio' in the 'Save the ocean' category. Pallavi won a Bronze award in the same category. The awards winners all received a tasteful Starpack award.

I was especially pleased with the best portfolio awards as this is so important to explain how the product was planned, designed, and developed. It also has a financial reward attached to it!



I have run this competition in schools that I have taught in for the last 8 years and this is the best set of outcomes so far. Organisers said there were nearly 200 entries this year and the standard was very high. Our students were up against GCSE and A Level students from all over the country, so this is a great achievement.

Mental Health

We are all aware that the numbers of children presenting with mental health issues has increased enormously in recent years. The reasons for this are complex and varied and there is no simple explanation or fix. In response to this we are in the process of rolling out MHFA (Mental Health First Aid) training to staff in all Maiden Erlegh Schools. We hope that this will empower staff and provide them with some basic skills by providing them with a framework within which to listen, support, provide information and encourage children and young people.

If you are concerned about your own child <u>Young Minds</u> is a very useful resource for children, parents and carers.

Here are some sensible basic parenting principles, taken from the website:

• Make sure they know you love them

and are proud of them. Even when things are busy or stressful, and it feels like you are in survival mode, a word or a hug can reassure them a huge amount. Praise them for what they do well, and encourage them to try new things.

- Be honest about your feelings you don't have to be perfect. We all get things wrong and shout or say unkind things from time to time. If this happens, say sorry to your child afterwards and explain why it happened, they will learn from you that it's OK to make mistakes and that it doesn't make you a bad person.
- Be clear about what is and isn't acceptable - and tell them why. Children need to know what is OK and what isn't, and what will happen if they cross the line. Follow through on what you say as otherwise they may get confused or stop respecting the boundaries.
- Own your own role you are the parent, so don't be afraid to take tough decisions. If your child sees you are scared of their reaction and always give in to them, it can make them feel very powerful, which can be frightening. Children need to know that you are there to keep them safe.

Stop the drop shun the gum

We have a great modern building in which to learn and grow. But we know we have to look after it! As a result we have launched a new campaign to eradicate litter and chewing gum from the school and this is something we are looking for all students to support as we go into another school year.



Careers, Work Experience, Work Related Learning and STEAM:

As we approach the end of another very busy term, we want to share with you the wide variety of opportunities students have had available to them as part of our careers, work experience, work-related and STEAM learning programme at Maiden Erlegh School in Reading:

Year 8 DigiGirlz Trip to Microsoft

On Tuesday 11 June 8 girls from Year 8 were fortunate to attend the DigiGirlz event at the Microsoft Campus in Thames Valley Business Park.

The girls learnt about technology, heard presentations from inspirational female speakers, connected with Microsoft employees, and participated in hands-on computer and technology workshops. The aim of the event was to empower young girls to consider STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Design and Mathematics) careers and to inspire them. Our girls had an excellent time and created some very impressive designs using technology.

Year 7 STEAM Day

On Friday 12 July, students in Year 7 were given an insight into the world of Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Design and Mathematics (STEAM). Kier, Thames Water and Reading Scientific Services Limited (RSSL) kindly agreed to host the day collaboratively where students participated in a number of different STEAM-related activities. A range of innovative and interactive activities allowed students to learn about STEAM

subjects and potential career pathways. Kier offered students the opportunity to take part in a spaghetti bridges challenge. Thames Water delivered a session called 'bin it don't block it' and RSSL delivered a session entitled 'rubbish science'. Students were also encouraged to discover the diverse career possibilities in these fields by speaking directly with the representatives from these organisations.

Year 9 People Like Me (boys)

On Thursday 11 July boys from Year 9 participated in the People Like Me event, delivered by Thales (one of our STEAM partners). This session uses boys' natural tendency to create and articulate their self-identity with adjectives to help them see themselves working happily and successfully in Science, Technology, Art and

Design, Engineering or Mathematics (STEAM) and forms part of the Maiden Erlegh Trust STEAM enrichment programme. Boys were able to engage with male engineers from a variety of different backgrounds and ask careers-related questions so they feel empowered to make decisions about their future destinations.





TeenTech 2019 Finals – IET, London

For the second year running Maiden Erlegh School in Reading had a team in the finals of the TeenTech Awards 2019.

TeenTech runs lively initiatives with a supporting award scheme to help young teenagers see the wide range of career possibilities in Science, Engineering and Technology. They work collaboratively with companies, universities, business organisations and education business partnerships to build sustainable and imaginative programmes focussing on regions of greater social need in the UK and Europe.

This prestigious event features strongly in our STEAM provision and we had three teams of students who started on their projects in September, often working after school every week to develop their projects. The teams went to great lengths to prepare their presentation and prototypes. All of the projects were submitted and one team was selected for the finals, V.I.E.W.S.

The V.I.E.W.S. team comprised three year 9 students, Samuel, Jasmina and Jubair and they won a Gold TeenTech Certificate. Their project was centred around the identification of unwanted drone activity around airfields which caused so much disruption recently. They carefully researched, planned and developed a series of prototypes to solve this topical issue. Originally their drone detection device was entered for the safety and security category but the organisers felt



that their project was of a high enough standard that it was judged in the 16-19 age group, Data Science category.

On the day, the students had the daunting task of presenting to the judges in a lecture theatre at the IET and respond to some tough questions from experts in the field.

The feedback from the judges was very positive ahead of the event where Accenture showed an interest.

Judge's comments: 'Overall, this is a clearly thought out and well executed project. The team clearly have a passion for technology and have chosen a topic that is both relevant and interesting to them. They articulated their problem statement well, and throughout the presentation clearly described each step in the process including detailed descriptions and diagrams on how the solution would be implemented'.

At the awards ceremony itself there was a chance to see a vast range of projects from schools all over the country and as far away as Hungary. The V.I.E.W.S. team was well received on the day by the many visitors to their stand as well as follow up enquiries from Cranfield University and Blue Bear Systems Research Limited.

The TeenTech event brings together the top STEAM projects in the country and is hosted by Maggie Philbin OBE. To reach the finals is a tremendous achievement and the students did themselves and the school proud.

We look forward to running the programme again next year and hopefully get more students involved in this event.
