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FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

I recently led an assembly with our students with the title "Attitude determines your Altitude". We considered together how our frame of mind and attitude towards life, school work and friendships is often the biggest determinant of success. 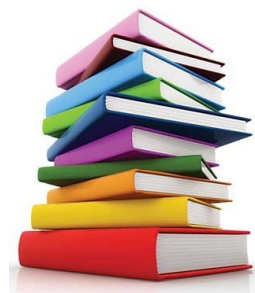

Future Architects

On Friday 3rd November a number of students participated in research that the school's architects, Stride-Treglown, are conducting. The aim of the research is to improve school building design in the future and specifically focuses on the way that school design aids student circulation. The school welcomed Eilish Barry, Architect at Stride and she facilitated a student focus group and conducted interviews. Following the research session, Ms Barry hosted a popular careers talk for students



interested in architecture, design and careers in associated industries and professions. The students that participated had an interesting time and a number of students are now thinking about the new schools THEY will design!

Peer Mediators

Year 9 students were offered the opportunity of applying for the role of Peer Mediator. Peer Mediators will be used to help other students with any concerns, and offer support where needed. Peer Mediators will be linked with a Year 7 tutor group, and will attend one day a week. Peer Mediators will also have two training sessions throughout the year, where they

will learn about supporting young people, positive behaviour, leadership and guidance, mental health and much more. We had a significant number of applicants, but are pleased to announce the final twelve have been chosen. Congratulations to these students, but also a huge 'well done' to those who applied – it made for a very difficult selection process. I am sure other students will gain great benefit from this programme.

School Uniform

We are very proud of our school uniform. The vast majority of students wear their uniform correctly and look very smart indeed.



We believe that uniform supports our culture of high standards, high achievement and good behaviour. When students put on their uniform, it helps them shift into "school" mode and a uniform avoids any issues around what to wear to school. It also reduces opportunities for bullying, acts as a safeguarding measure and enhances the idea that we are one community.

This week the challenge was to make square and cube shaped bubbles. The students constructed their own cube shapes and made their own bubble mix.



They then had great fun making a vast number of different shaped bubbles with almost everyone perfecting the art of making a cube shaped bubble! We will be using Chemistry to make indoor fireworks after half term, something the students are very much looking forward to.



First School Disco

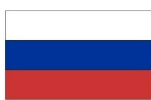
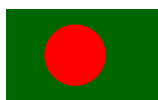

Model Climate Conference



On Friday, 1st December, 29 Year 8 Silver Programme students, accompanied by Mr Harrison and Mr Jackson, attended the UN (United Nations) Model Climate Change Conference and Local Action Summit at the Reading Civic Centre. They even travelled sustainably on the bus to keep down their personal carbon emissions! This is the second year students from Maiden Erlegh School in Reading have attended the event and this year they represented 5 nations: Bangladesh, Brazil, India, Russia and the United Kingdom.



The conference is designed to replicate the proper UN COPs (Conference of Parties) which take place every year in November/December. This year's took place in Bonn, Germany and was attended by the vast majority of the world's nations. The conference in Reading was attended by

schools from different parts of Reading and represented 16 nations in total. The Mayor of Reading, Rose Williams, opened the proceedings with students then delivering high level speeches from the point of view of the countries they were representing. There was then healthy and respectful debate about each country's carbon emissions and what they were doing to mitigate and adapt to the effects of Climate Change. Students, on behalf of their nations, then had to make alliances with other countries in an attempt to secure a low carbon future for generations to come. Finally, students attended workshops designed to make them think of how climate change can be mitigated. These ranged from food waste discussions to sustainable transport and outdoor nature spaces locally in Reading.

Our students were amongst the youngest there but did themselves and our school proud. They were knowledgeable, assertive and persistent in their approach and attitude. I am sure they will return to school wishing to put many of their ideas into practice. Well done to our future UN ambassadors!



Gurdwara trip

On Monday 27th November Year 7 Purple Pathway students, accompanied by the Year 9 ASDAN group went to the Gurdwara on the Cumberland Road.

A good time was had by all.

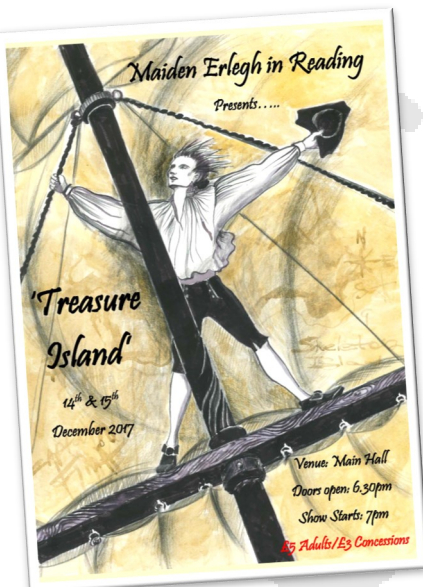




Treasure Island Rehearsal Update

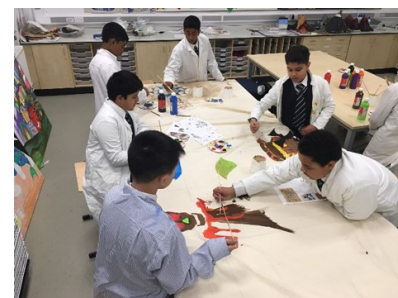
Arts Award

Treasure Island

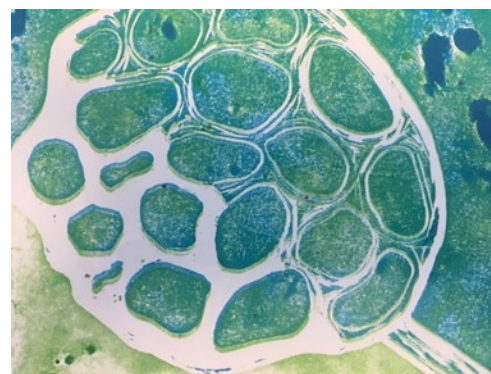

Year 9 Paintings

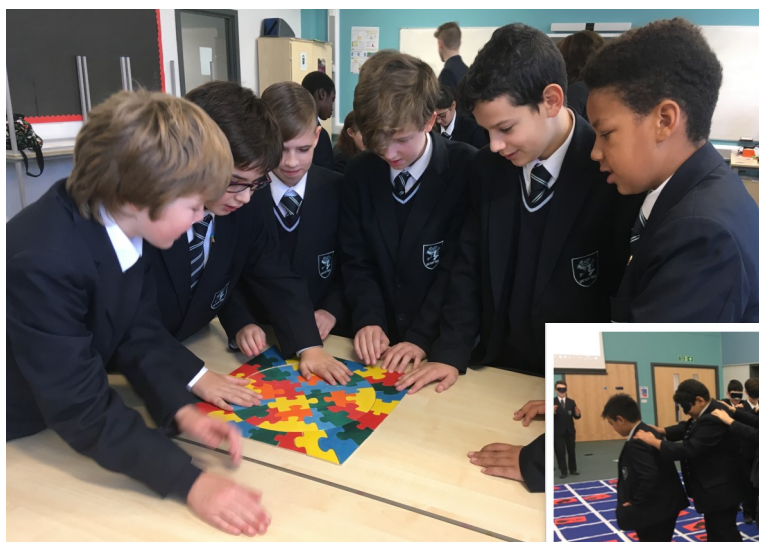


Year 9 Artwork – Lino prints

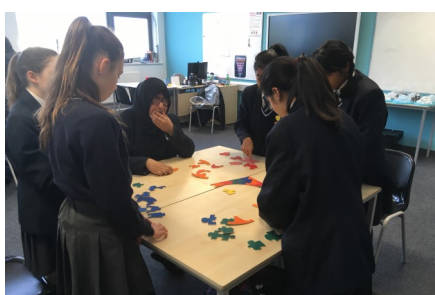
Mathematics Enrichment Puzzle Day

On Wednesday November 29th, Year 7 students took part in a mathematics enrichment puzzle day, delivered by the department teaching team as well as a guest from the Happy Puzzle Company.

The students took part in a carousel of activities all centred around improving the students' appreciation and enjoyment of mathematics. Students worked in small groups with their peers to discover the Indian multiplication grid and how this links to creating Islamic art, crack World War II codes and learn about the important work of Bletchley Park during the war, as well as a logical investigation of real-life problems and scenarios requiring application of mathematical skills. Students were also fortunate to take part in a session delivered by the Happy Puzzle Company, which focussed on hands-on puzzles and

problems requiring efficient team work, cooperation, and application of logical reasoning. The presenter spoke very highly of our students who were superb ambassadors for the school.

Students responded positively about their experiences during the day, stating that working collaboratively helped them to 'share ideas' and 'learn new ways to approach tasks'.
