

The second half of the Spring term has had its fair share of snow which led to some disruption. This, however, hasn't dented our determination to focus on the development and learning of our students. Students have continued to work hard and, due to the support of our expert staff, are making great progress. This half term has seen a particular focus on assisting Year 8 students with their option choices. We have developed a broad and balanced curriculum "offer" which makes provision for different students with a variety of interests and our information and guidance programme has been particularly strong this year. We want all students to succeed and we think our Key Stage 4 programme gives students the opportunity to do just that. We have held a Careers fair, an options evening, taster lessons and a student progress (parents) meeting and many students have been discussing the particulars of courses with members of staff and curriculum leaders. Every single student has been offered a one to one meeting with a senior member of staff to discuss or review their option choices and I have been extremely impressed by the way that Year 8 students have been carefully considering their choices and making very wise decisions.

I am delighted to be able to report that the school is, once again, oversubscribed for 2018/2019 with more families than ever choosing Maiden Erlegh School in Reading. This is important as not only does a full roll mean that we receive maximum funding, but it also indicates the value of our new school to the local community. Through the remainder of the year we will be working hard to ensure that the new Year 7s will have a great start in September.

Staff worked extremely hard to plan and present an excellent day that really stimulated and stretched students in different ways. The catering team also




designed a special menu for the day which went down very well.

Approximately forty-five companies and organisations sent representatives to the event, providing extremely valuable guidance on Careers and Further and


Higher Education choice for the students of our two schools.

The students took advantage of the event and turned up in large numbers. Being able to speak to people about what they enjoy about their job gave the students valuable insight into what might be involved.

Technology and STEM busy term!



Students involved in Technology and STEM activities have been very busy working towards completing their project work and submissions for National Competitions.

Currently the Technology students have been working on a project competition for 3M in Bracknell. Along with Gold Programme students, Year 9 technology students have been designing and making products to improve the quality of life for young people with visual impairment. The challenge has been to design and make a product that meets the brief and is made from recycled and sustainable materials. This has proved challenging, but the outcomes have been very innovative.

The Year 9 Visual Communications students have been entering the Starpack packaging competition with a range of design briefs set by packaging industry leaders.

Finally, the Green Energy Technology group are reaching the end of their TeenTech Awards projects. The students have produced a diverse and detailed range of projects that have sought to use some form of alternative energy.

The deadlines for these projects are all before the end of term, so we will update on how the entries got on next term.




A busy Year 9 practical lesson

Parents and students were given a brief presentation about KS4 by Mrs Elliss and then they were able to visit the Options subjects. Students were able to see some examples of Year 9 work and to find out about the examination requirements in each of the options subjects. It was an informative evening which helped students make some decisions about which subjects to choose to study in Years 9-11.



On Monday 12th March we celebrated British Science Day as part of British Science Week which is a national event organised by the British Science Association.

In each of their lessons students watched a short biography about a British Scientist. Alexander Fleming and his discovery of penicillin, the role of Rosalind Franklin in the discovery of the structure of DNA, Sir Isaac Newton, Charles Darwin and Maggie Aderin-Pocock who currently presents The Sky at Night on television, were all featured.

We also had a visit by Dr. Nigel Page from Kingston University who talked to year 9 students about his work as a scientist. After school he did a Question and Answer session and judged the Poster Competition that all students were invited to get involved in.







Reading Schools Netball League -




