FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Welcome to the first edition of The Pulse for this academic year.

As we head towards half term, we do so with an overwhelming sense of relief; finally we have our school back together and students in classrooms able to hear and see members of teaching staff face to face!

We have been able to achieve this with a number of safety measures in place and I want to thank parents, students and staff alike for supporting these vital measures. As a result, our provision has not, at this stage, been too disrupted by COVID related absence. We will continue to be diligent in these matters and after half term we will be taking some time to "reset" and remind everyone of the things we need to do (and not do) and the reasons why. We have also been working very hard to put in place detailed contingency plans so that we are able to continue delivering high quality teaching and learning in the case of any future lockdown or restrictions. We hope that doesn't happen, but we must be prepared.

Meanwhile, students and staff have been working together to understand where learning gaps have opened up during the lockdown period and to consider how we can move forward to help students to catch up. On the whole, our students are very resilient and the majority of them worked hard during lockdown to ensure that they weren't too far behind when they restarted in September. Unlike some schools, we decided not to subject students to a barrage of tests and assessments upon their return; instead our expert staff have been making their own professional judgements, subject by subject to identify what steps we need to take. As a result, curriculum plans have been adjusted and specific helpful interventions



have been identified and will be put in place. After half-term, we will be writing to you to outline, more fully, our plans and how students will benefit.

I have been very impressed with the serious approach that so many of our students have taken to their learning. I have had the privilege of showing around a number of visitors to the school, and consistently they see a school fully into its stride - fantastic teaching leading to robust and successful learning. Classrooms are calm and purposeful as staff and students work together to discover and develop knowledge and skills. We were particularly pleased to welcome in our new year 7 students and to help them settle into our school community. We look forward to getting to know each individual and look forward to the contribution they will make to our school life.

The first half term of the year is always busy as we restart the year, welcome new staff and students and get down to the business of great learning. This one has been particularly busy with all of the additional challenges already mentioned. I therefore wish all of our stakeholders a good half term break - we are all certainly ready for one!

In the meantime, please enjoy reading this edition of The Pulse – full of exciting news and highlights from the last few weeks which tells the good news story of a school that is very much open for business.



In Year 10 I spoke about the climb that we had and we were one step closer to our GCSEs. I spoke about the challenges ahead and that together we can accomplish lots.





A young carer is someone under 18 who is caring unpaid for a family member or friend who is ill, frail, disabled or has mental health or addiction problems. They often take on practical and/or emotional caring responsibilities that would normally be expected of an adult. Research suggests there are at least 700,000 young carers in the UK, but many do not realise they are a young carer.

We know that young carers may need a little extra support to enjoy and do well


at school. We are committed to ensuring that all pupils who are young carers are identified, and supported effectively.






You are probably aware that we ask students to buy their own copies of our 3 set GCSE literature texts – *Macbeth, An Inspector Calls and A Christmas Carol.* The fourth text, a poetry anthology, is provided free to students by the exam board – Edexcel. We encourage students to buy their own books because they like to annotate them with notes from class which makes them unusable for future students. To make it easier for students to buy their books, we now have an online Parent Pay Bookshop where you can drop one of the set texts into your basket at any time. Once you have paid for the books, it will be delivered to your son/ daughter at the end of the week by their form tutor. There are also revision guides available to complement the set texts.



Black History Month - Maiden Erlegh School in Reading

Black History Month is a month of celebration and education where we look at the contribution of black people from all walks of life who have influenced the way that we live.

During Black History Month, we will learn how people of colour have contributed to our history.

This year – 2020 in Maiden Erlegh School Reading Black History Month took on a different guise.

We looked at the contributions of men and women of various countries who have

contributed greatly not only to black history, but to history as a whole. We sought to identify areas of the



curriculum where individuals of colour are significantly lacking in representation and are looking at ways to bringing them to the forefront.

At Maiden Erlegh in Reading, we learned, through virtual assemblies, how the life of those of African heritage and the African Diaspora have been present in the United Kingdom since the 4th Century. Our senior students undertook a project to trace black history in our country from the Roman era to the present day. Our careers team have sought to inspire our students by focusing on black excellence within a number of industries to inspire our students to aim high.

Computing - The Bebras Challenge 2020

The Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge is an annual event organised by the Raspberry Pi Foundation and Oxford University to test the problem solving and abstract reasoning skills of students. Students get to practise their computational thinking skills while

solving exciting, accessible, and puzzling questions. Last year over 250,000 people took part from UK schools, with the highest achievers invited to a special finalist event at Oxford University.

In the fortnight after half term, all our students in Year 7 and 8 plus GCSE Computer Scientists will be taking part in the challenge during their Computing lessons. We look forward to seeing some brilliant results from our young people, who regularly demonstrate excellent skills in this area.
