Year 1 & 2 have been learning about fairy tale stories like Beauty and the Beast, they have been retelling the story and have written their own fairy tales.










Year 3 have been learning about magnets and forces in their Science learning, they have applied what they have learnt to make magnetic track games and puppets with moving parts.












Years 5&6 are exploring their topic of 'Space' and have created some fantastic space-themed artwork and cross-stitch Space phone cases.

MAIDEN ERLEGH SCHOOL


Maiden Erlegh School was shortlisted for the TES Secondary School of the Year award.

Support for Year 10 and 11 on revision has included sessions for students and parents from the Positively MAD organisation.

MAIDEN ERLEGH CHILTERN EDGE

Maiden Erlegh Chiltern Edge have maintained over 95.3% attendance across the whole term.

The school have also begun their online catch up tutoring programme for 30 Year 8 students focusing on Science knowledge improvement.

They have hosted several online astronomy lectures.

The School has participated in the virtual Model United Nations with students from around the world.

Maiden Erlegh Chiltern Edge have led two cohorts of students in the Brilliant Club working with Oxford University in a programme researching the history of the French Revolution.



They have also re-launched their House system after a two year hiatus.









MAIDEN ERLEGH SCHOOL IN READING

Maiden Erlegh School in Reading received confirmation from the Careers and Enterprise Company that it meets all 8 Gatsby Benchmarks for good Career Guidance.

The school has been designated a LELE school, recognising our inclusive ethos.

Huge focus on Anti-Bullying work under the title "Bullying: Let's talk about it...." and a high profile for national anti-bullying week: whole school anti-bullying charter, focus in lessons and assemblies and new ways for students to report and share their concerns.

Very active student leadership team (in all years) in supporting charity work e.g.: packing 48 shoe boxes of Christmas goodies for CIRDIC (Churches in Reading Drop in Centre) for the homeless.

The school's entry was selected as one of the 100 images displayed as part of the Duchess of Cambridge's & National Portrait Gallery's digital Hold Still 2000 exhibition.

Strong support for Black history month across the curriculum areas.

All students in foundation have taken part in a very successful BEBRAS Computational thinking challenge in IT.

Four students have been selected for the prestigious Kelly Holmes Trust "Unlocking Potential" mentoring scheme (only 80 places offered across the country for more disadvantaged and vulnerable students).

Crisp packets to blankets – recycling project, turning crisp packets into thermal blankets for the homeless.

Very strong attendance in the second half term (jumping up 5%) and well above national and local averages, coupled with an excellent attitude to learning across the school (special mention for Year 11 and their fantastically successful PPE series).

Berkshire TSA held its first ever virtual Train to Teach event on 26 November. There was huge interest, despite being held virtually.
