FROM THE HEADTEACHER

As we approach the end of another half term that has been hugely affected by the ongoing COVID emergency, I am proud to report that the Maiden Erlegh School in Reading community is rising to the challenges and showing our typical grit and determination to keep learning and keep caring for one another.

Many of our students have been putting our DREAM acronym into action during their "Live" and "non-live"



lessons and it has been heartening to see so many of them receiving house points and recognition for showing these important characteristics. After all, going to school isn't just about learning facts but is also about experiencing an environment that nurtures personal development and growth in character. So many of our students have grown and matured in the face of the difficulties put in their way by the lockdown and it is heartening to recognise the resilience and resourcefulness of MER students.

With one day's notice the whole school switched to our remote learning programme and it has been hugely impressive to see how our students have coped with this. We have certainly all developed and improved in the way we deliver and engage with online learning; both teachers and student have learnt a raft of new skills to support learning and feedback and to ensure that our fantastic curriculum continues. Thank you to all stakeholders for your comments and suggestions. As long as we have to continue in this remote phase, we will look to improve our provision. I am also pleased to report that the school has distributed in excess of 100 laptops/tablets and SIM cards to students across the school to ensure that everyone has access to learning.

I must continue to pay tribute to our fantastic staff team who have adjusted so well to the challenge of the current lockdown. While we would all much prefer to be in the same classrooms together, we have made the best possible response to moving to remote delivery. So many of my colleagues are desperate to do anything they can to support our families and to ensure that students are supported in their learning and wellbeing. As a result, we have made thousands of welfare and learning support phone calls and tried to

ensure that students who need it get the help and support they require.

While the school may be physically closed

to the majority of students, the building is still very much open with around 50 students per day using our special provision. This requires significant staffing (all the more so as we have implemented greater social distancing for those in school) and I would like to thank both teaching and, in particular, many of our support staff who have been in school to ensure that we are able to cater for children of critical workers and some of our more vulnerable students. Many staff have overcome their own domestic challenges of home-schooling their children or caring for others to maintain and support both our special provision and the remote curriculum.

Our students in Year 11 have faced particular uncertainty as the government concludes its planning for the processes that will be introduced in the summer to replace the normal GCSE examinations. We know that many students are understandably anxious, but I am proud of the way so many in year 11 have been determined to keep learning and keep preparing for their qualifications what ever the specific plans look like. Moreover this year group is determined to get to where they want to go and it is encouraging that around 80% of students have already secured provisional places at 6th forms and colleges or on apprenticeship programmes.

The cold and dark winter months have been difficult for all of us this year, but with the lengthening of the days and the promise of spring, perhaps we can be forgiven for feeling more optimistic as we look into 2021. The vaccine programme continues apace and the COVID transmission rates appear to be falling. We hope that as soon as is safe to do so, schools will reopen and we can all get back to doing the things we enjoy and see the ones we love. Until then we must continue to support the national effort to combat COVID and follow the safety advice we have been given. I wish all our students and their families a peaceful and restful half term break.

AQA Entry level units

To develop our Inclusion offer and allow more students who are struggling to access mainstream lessons, we have introduced AQA Entry Level Units. For more information and to see the variety of topics on offer please see https://www.aga.org.uk/ programmes/unit-award-scheme. In summary, this is project-based work that is submitted for certification.

This has allowed students to re-engage. enabling them to refocus in lessons, as well as gaining certification for entry level or pre entry level. We have already had a successful start with a course in learning how to tattoo! Very creative!



Three national lockdowns have caused a huge change in how teachers teach. A new type of teaching has come into play – blended learning – and no doubt, it's here to stay.

Like all schools, staff - both teachers and those in supporting roles

- at Maiden Erlegh Reading have been grappling with a whole new set of challenges since Covid-19 hit. But our chief concern has been to keep students learning. How could we give them the lesson content they need, offer feedback on their work and all without seeing them in the classroom?



Challenges

One first challenge has been to make sure students have access to the technology on

which to do their lessons; the school has loaned out 83 devices and provided some families with unlimited data allowances to allow students to participate in live lessons with their classmates.

Then the way we give students lesson content has changed. Teachers have been, and still are, on steep learning curves themselves, getting to grips with new platforms and software – Pear deck, Loom, GCSE POD, Google Apps, Google Meet, and Microsoft Teams. How can we encourage student participation in lessons? Load up a Jam board to record ideas generated in an online discussion. Record a Loom (audio file) to explain the work as students look at it on a PowerPoint. Share a Google slides file

so that students can all edit a document together – much like doing group work in class and recording ideas on a big piece of paper. Need to assess their work? Use an online rubric to award a mark to a piece of work. Have the lesson in Google Meet open on your phone as well as your computer so you can monitor students' questions and



answers at the same time as presenting. Much of the training in this has happened after school when students have finished lessons, and has been led by Miss Hind, our in-house EdTech expert, and one of our assistant head teachers. Teachers are having to be nimble and adaptable – but we're doing it! As I write this, my colleagues are participating in a virtual professional development day logging into Zoom sessions to undertake training delivered by members of the Trust.

Student Welfare

School is more than just lessons in National Curriculum subjects: the pastoral and inclusion teams, led by the very capable Mr Hood and Miss Burns, our pastoral leaders, are working extremely hard to ensure student welfare is taken care of. We are aware of how mental health can be affected by working alone so calls to check in on how students are doing are being made by a number of staff, and heads of year are working with those students who are finding it more difficult to engage in this type of remote learning. Every day starts for students with a tutor period so important routines are preserved and there is some social contact with friends and classmates. Heads of year are still taking assemblies - dozens of students and numerous staff all join an online meeting - quite a sight to behold. Support staff are getting to grips with providing a Covid testing programme. Sadly, some staff and students have suffered bereavements and there is a great effort made to ensure the welfare of these members of the school community.

Special Provision

And of course, while all this is going on, school is OPEN! Every day, we welcome between 50 or 60 students, whose parents are key workers, into our Special Provision classes - a sort of pop-up school within the main school.



These students join their classmates in online lessons but also have the chance to take a break away from their screens to participate in an actual PE or Art lesson. Staff are supervising these classes at the same time as planning and delivering their online lessons, attending meetings and of course, some are doing all this as well as homeschooling their own children.

Online learning cannot replace face-to-face teaching but we are learning how to deliver a different type of education and our students have embraced it with us. There is no doubt that some aspects of what teachers are learning will be used to complement our more usual teaching strategies as we return to school when the lockdown is over. While much about the Pandemic is out of our control, we can make sure there is a positive legacy: a greater teaching method repertoire, a flexible and upskilled workforce and an ability to quickly adapt and change as new government guidelines are produced and the effects of the pandemic cause unpredictable fluctuations. We've had to all change - but we've done it, and a lot of those changes are here to stay.

Options Evening was held on 28th January and was attended by a huge proportion of Year 8. The stream of questions was so welcome as it reinforced how committed the year group are to their futures and the



choices they will soon be making. Reminder – Options Forms are due in $5^{\mbox{th}}$ March.

For Key Stage 3 the DCPs are now in and will be available for students to access from February 8th. For the large majority, the DCPs will reflect the consistent hard work, perseverance and engagement that has been showcased and are fully deserved. Further to this, year 7 and 8 progress meetings are taking place this month and we look forward to being able to discuss each student's progress. Please look out for information around booking appointments.

Even though times have changed - the most important thing is for you to believe in yourself: you CAN succeed and you CAN do well.





Some ideas for a lockdown valentines (please adhere to government guidelines)


- Set up a restaurant in your kitchen. Make a menu and cook your favourite dishes - candles are optional.

Geography Department January 2021 House Competition




