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FROM THE HEADTEACHER

As we approach the Easter holidays and as spring bursts into life, it is with great relief that I can proudly report that our school is fully open and very much back into the swing of teaching and supporting our students. I would like to thank all of our parents, staff and of course our students for showing resilience and determination to overcome the challenges of the lockdown. Our students have returned to school eager to learn and delighted to see their friends and classmates. Whilst our school is a place of work and endeavour, it is first and foremost a community and I think we are all delighted to see our community back together again.

My staff are very focused on the challenges that the lockdown has thrown our way, but we are very determined not to accept the negative and defeatist mindset of some of the voices we hear on the national stage. I think it is better that we focus on the positive <u>achievements</u> of so many of our hardworking students during lock down and highlight the learning that has been accomplished and the brave triumphs achieved. Students have done so well and worked so hard in difficult circumstances and everyone

involved with our online provision (including our parents) deserves huge thanks and praise for what was accomplished. Yes, we will need to make curriculum adjustments and provide support those students for whom lockdown was most challenging and we have in place a carefully planned and robust catch-up strategy to support this. But for the majority, of students, through our robust curriculum and through great teaching, we believe that the long term educational impact of the lockdown can and will be minimised over time. I certainly don't buy the line that our students are a "lost generation" or who are condemned to a life of underachievement and this has been clearly shown in the way that our year 11 students have returned to school and have immediately thrown themselves into their all-important PPE examinations and other year groups have got back into their learning routines.

We were delighted with the success of our mass testing programme. It was a huge challenge for us to set up and run a testing centre in the school at the same time as reopening the school for our normal business. Yet my amazing staff

and some fantastic community volunteers made this happen. I should like to publicly thank this marvellous and generous tea

marvellous and generous team for their contribution to ensuring our school has opened safely.

After Easter and as long as COVID restrictions allow, we would like to get our extra-curricular programme going. Staff are champing at the bit to launch long delayed clubs and opportunities. Fingers crossed that the prevalence of COVID remains low and that we are able to do these – everyone has missed them. We also await government guidance about the safety measures we are implementing in school – these are being reviewed by the DfE during the Easter break. We will let you know as more information is published.

Despite the restrictions much has been going on in the school. Hopefully this edition of the Pulse gives you a flavour.

Buying Set GCSE English Literature Texts - Years 9, 10, 11 - Parent Pay Online Bookshop

You are probably aware that we ask students to buy their own copies of our 3 set GCSE literature texts – *Macbeth, An Inspector Calls and A Christmas Carol.* The fourth text, a poetry anthology, is provided free to students by the exam board – Edexcel. We encourage students to buy their own books because they like to annotate them with notes from class which makes them unusable for future students. To make it easier for students to buy their books, we now have an online Parent Pay Bookshop where you can drop one of the set texts into your basket at any time. Once you have paid for the books, it will be delivered to your son/ daughter at the end of the week by their form tutor. There are also revision guides available to complement the set texts.

Any student who is in receipt of Pupil Premium Funding can apply for assistance with the cost of the books if needed – just email the office on

Animal Aid - Veganism Talk



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


Rapid Lateral Flow Testing Centre

We have now completed 1,971 lateral flow tests over the period from 8-18 March 2021. Support staff have managed to carry out tests on top of their usual day jobs as we balance the needs of testing with the needs of students as we reopen the school. time to support the testing programme. All students who have been tested in school have now been provided with home testing kits and we hope that wide scale testing will continue to keep the school community as safe as possible during the pandemic. A Place in Our Community

For PSMSC this term, year 9 have been looking at various topics on the theme of 'A Place in Our Community'. On Friday 26th March, the topic was on 'Visible and Invisible Disability'. The students were lucky to listen to the life story of Paralympian athlete 'Scott Meenagh' who sadly lost both of his legs whilst serving as a soldier in the Parachute Regiment. Scott gave the students great insight about the similarities, differences and diversity among people of different abilities and disability. Scott finished the talk by

giving light on some strategies for safely challenging stereotyping and prejudice when experiencing it in daily life. The students found the talk really interesting and very thought provoking.





Return to School in the Arts

The return to face to face school has given the arts faculty (Art, Drama, Music & Photography) the opportunity to relaunch the practical side of each subject where COVID risk assessments have permitted. The faculty have taken a "practical first" approach in order to strengthen and consolidate the online learning during lockdown.
