Dear Parent/Guardian

As we come to the end of another challenging academic year, I wanted to thank you for all your support of your child's school. I cannot express how important it has been for colleagues to receive or hear your kind words of thanks and encouragement over recent months. Never before have they needed that as much.

Schools are very clearly focused on ensuring they can continue to support, encourage, and enthuse your children next year, building on the work they have already started this year.

I must commend your children on their resilience, hard work and cooperation. Of course, we must not underestimate the impact of the pandemic on children and young people, and the schools are very conscious of this in their planning. I can honestly say, however, that those I see in our schools are impressive in their resilience, care, and determination to not let this experience define them. For that reason, I refuse to use terms such as "lost generation", "falling behind", "held back". We will help and support them, but I am confident that they are committed to being the positive agents of their own success also.

Despite everything that has happened, we have also achieved great things e.g.:

- Schools have gained external accreditation for anti-bullying and equality work.
- As an organisation, Diversity & Inclusion Actions have made gains especially in terms of the curriculum and recruitment, and we devoted our Conference last January to this theme. There's more to do, of course, and we will pick up again in September.
- Our inclusive moral purpose can be seen in our work towards the September 2022 opening of [Oak Tree School](#) and the September 2021 opening of Maiden Erlegh School's Indigo ASD Resource Base as well as the STEPS programmes at Maiden Erlegh Reading. This is in addition to the work going on at Cranbury College to support some of the most vulnerable, but potential-filled youngsters (including at hospital) and the blossoming provision at Hamilton School (which will move to its new site next Spring).
- Work towards [River Academy](#) also continues.
- Our PSMSC curriculum has been reviewed from early years to sixth form, not least the Relationships and Sexual Health Education element which covers themes such as sexual abuse and cyber safety.
- From September we launch our new Maiden Erlegh Institute which will lead on teacher training, early careers framework support, school-to-school support, Behaviour Hub, Challenge Partners Hub and a wider professional development offer. This will enable us to work with and for, an even greater range of schools across the region.

It is important that we all make the most of the coming weeks. Whether you are heading abroad, going away in the UK or staying at home, I sincerely hope that you all enjoy a restful and happy summer.

## OPERATION EAGLE “SURGE” RESPONSE

In early June, the school supported and contributed to the Surge testing programme in our local area. We ensured that a 1000 PCR tests were distributed to staff and students took the opportunity to further educate our students and parents on the purpose for the programme and the importance of participating to keep our community safe.

## DAME KELLY HOLMES TRUST MENTORING PROGRAMME

We were very proud that three (out of 100 students selected nationally) of our students were invited onto this prestigious “unlocking potential” mentoring programme (only 100 students invited nationally). These students, all of whom have overcome huge hurdles in their life have done so well and completed the course with tremendous success.

It is great news that the school street application from ourselves, UTC Reading and Alfred Sutton Primary school has been successful and has the support of Reading Borough Council. 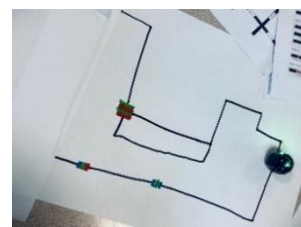
