


What fantastic work from the French Year 7 and Year 8 classes commemorating the end of the First World War on the 11th November.


Buying Set GCSE English Literature Texts – Years 9, 10, 11 – Parent Pay Online Bookshop

You are probably aware that we ask students to buy their own copies of our 3 set GCSE literature texts – *Macbeth, An Inspector Calls and A Christmas Carol.* The fourth text, a poetry anthology, is provided free to students by the exam board – Edexcel. We encourage students to buy their own books because they like to annotate them with notes from class which makes them unusable for future students. To make it easier for students to buy their books, we now have an online Parent Pay Bookshop where you can drop one of the set texts into your basket at any time. Once you have paid for the books, it will be delivered to your son/ daughter at the end of the week by their form tutor. There are also revision guides available to complement the set texts.

Food Technology

Pasta Making

Year 8 food technology students were set the challenge of making fresh pasta from scratch using a pasta making machine. The students began by making a dough from flour and egg. They then flattened their dough and passed it through the pasta machine whilst regularly dusting the machine with a flour dredger to prevent it from sticking. The students continued to roll the pasta through the pasta machine, turning the handle whilst supporting the dough as it gradually became thinner, into their chosen type of pasta. Termly Food Journal - September to December

It has been a busy time in the Food Department since September in KS3 Food Technology (Y7 and Y8) and KS4 GCSE Food Preparation & Nutrition (Y9, Y10 and Y11). Mrs McCarthy and Miss Frost have been delighted with the wonderful, creative practical work the students have produced.

Year 7: Food Technology

This year group has had opportunities to explore and experience how to work in the food room. The main focusses have been on hygiene and safety practices as well as understanding how to use a range of unit equipment. For some students this has been an extremely new experience so well done on embracing the need for team work.

The practical opportunities have included:

 Knife skills challenge – carrot/potato (Bridge and claw technique)



- Sensory taste testing – coleslaw
- Pasta salad in a Jar using the hob, vegetable preparation, presentation
- Chicken nuggets using the oven, meat preparation, using a meat probe

Next term, look forward to developing

your practical skills in making chicken/ vegetable curry, savoury mince, pizza pin wheels and finally a free choice dish using pasta.

Year 8: Food Technology

This year group has had to wait a whole year to enjoy the opportunities to explore and experience how to work hygienically and safely in the food room. The main focusses have been on developing key practical skills and using more specialist unit equipment. All students have been extremely enthusiastically working as a team and demonstrating a range of complex practical skills.

The practical opportunities have included:

- Knife skills challenge carrot/potato (Bridge and claw technique)
- Southern style chicken and sweet potato wedges using the oven, meat and vegetable preparation, using a meat probe, flavours and textures

- Macaroni cheese using the hob, making a roux sauce, cooking pasta, presentation/garnish a dish
- Making fresh pasta using the pasta machine, team work, cooking fresh pasta, combining with tomato sauce to create a one portion meal.



Next term, we look forward to developing your practical skills in making pasties, savoury mince, a free choice dish using mince or Quorn mince.

Congratulations to recent leaver Samuel who was successful in his application for an Arkwright Engineering Scholarship.

The Smallpiece Trust announced that there were 1,297 applications for 2021 scholarships. The uncertainty surrounding Covid has had a big impact on their sponsors leading to fewer scholarships. 287 have been awarded so far this year, down from 305 in 2020 and 412 in 2019.

Samuel had to submit a detailed application and was selected for a rigorous online interview with industry and educational experts. He was successful in his application and has received sponsorship throughout his A Level studies from the Cyber Security company, Crowdstrike.

Samuel also won his category in the 2021 TeenTech Awards with his Red Kite project which was a tremendous achievement. He has also returned to MER to receive his award from Mr Johnson and also to mentor some of our Year 7 TeenTech students.

For our first cultural day, it was a great experience. Students loved learning about different cultures and there was a great atmosphere in the school.


