## Year 10 Geography fieldtrip to Lyndhurst and Milford on Sea

On the 13<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> June our year 10 GCSE Geography pupils spent a day carrying out two fieldwork investigations at Lyndhurst and Milford on Sea as a part of the course. The pupils arrived at Lyndhurst in The New Forest for the morning to collect data on the impact of tourism. Pupils carried out a land use survey by recording the shops/businesses along the high street as well as judging the environmental quality of two sites along the way. Finally, pupils carried out an emoji questionnaire by having some very positive and engaging conversations with residents/visitors about their opinions on tourism.

The pupils then travelled on to Milford on Sea to carry out a physical Geography

study into the effectiveness of the coastal defences. To judge this the pupils drew a field sketch of the beach and judged the effectiveness of the defences at three individual locations along the coast. The pupils also conducted a study of the groynes to measure how effective they were at stopping long shore drift. This was also an opportunity for the pupils to enjoy the glorious weather and the experience of being at the coast.

The pupils found the trip a very rewarding experience and they can now solidify their knowledge by completing write up work in their Geography lessons ahead of their GCSE Paper 3 exam next year.

### Year 10 Trip to Zebra Technologies

On Monday 20 June, 39 Year 10 students and 5 teachers/support staff headed off on the bus to Bourne End. We arrived safely for a day at the plush offices of Zebra Technologies.

Not many (or any?) of us could say what Zebra Tech did as a company before the day started – however, by the end of the day the students were able to actively tell us and the Zebra Tech team all they had learned.

The day started with students being warmly greeted by EBP and the Zebra Tech Team and getting their unique ID card for the day (printed by Zebra Tech – small hint here about part of what they do) and being split into 4 teams – Blue, Green, Red and Yellow.

The wonderful team from Zebra Tech staff then introduced themselves and shared about the jobs they do – students discovered that there can be many different types of jobs within one company – even if that company is involved in creating technology. Staff from Sales, Marketing, Human Resources (HR), and engineering – who work in the UK and overseas shared about their role within the company and then led students in small groups. Students showed great interest as they intently listened to the staff team talk about technologies Zebra Tech created and ones which we may experience in our own lives without even

knowing – ranging from Scanners used in shops for personal shopping, to robots, to scanners with RFID (Radio Frequency Identification/ID) – ask students who attended what this means!, to labels – both regular labels and those with RFID – used in manufacturing, warehouses and even for patients in hospitals. We discovered that many Zebra Tech



products are even used by big company names that we all know and love. We also discovered that Zebra Technology is an inclusive employer – actively seeking to ensure their workforce reflects as many represented in society as possible.

It was great fun when students (and staff!) had the opportunity to take part in a competition – who could scan some factory boxes the fastest using Zebra Tech scanners? We discovered that Year 10 student, Reeha, was definitely the fastest with a score of around 8 seconds! Well done, Reeha – we love the photo of you collecting your prize. The teams asked

fantastic questions during the sessions and were like sponges – soaking in all the Zebra Tech team were telling them. This information was useful not only to remember about the company but because the day ended with a Team Kahoot Challenge. 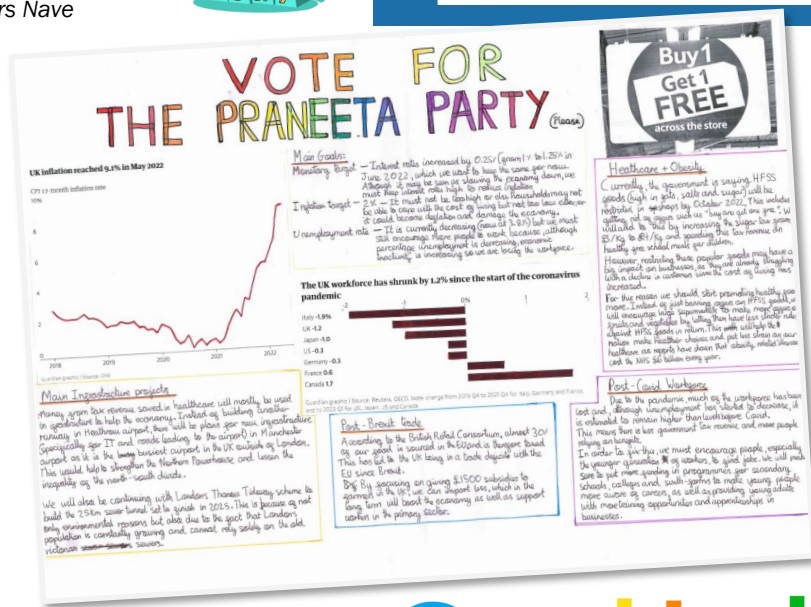
**Task: Write a leadership manifesto for your political party.**

We have included some book recommendations for our students to check out over the long vacation.

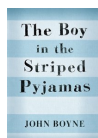

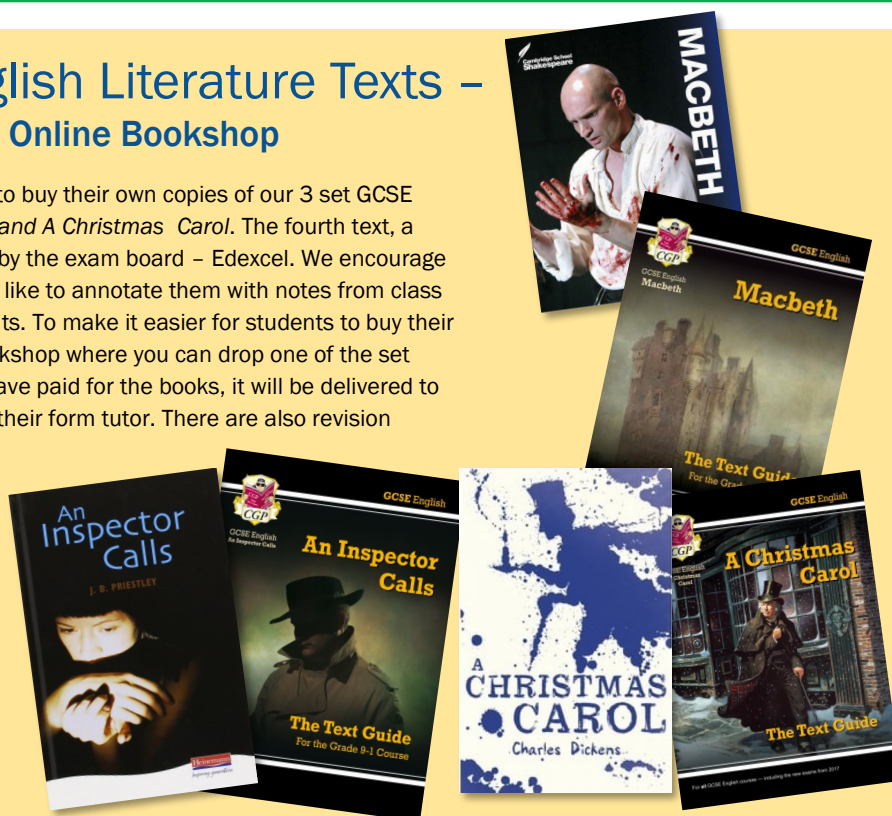


## Buying Set GCSE English Literature Texts – Years 9, 10, 11 – Parent Pay Online Bookshop

You are probably aware that we ask students to buy their own copies of our 3 set GCSE literature texts – *Macbeth*, *An Inspector Calls* and *A Christmas Carol*. The fourth text, a poetry anthology, is provided free to students by the exam board – Edexcel. We encourage students to buy their own books because they like to annotate them with notes from class which makes them unusable for future students. To make it easier for students to buy their books, we now have an online Parent Pay Bookshop where you can drop one of the set texts into your basket at any time. Once you have paid for the books, it will be delivered to your son/ daughter at the end of the week by their form tutor. There are also revision guides available to complement the set texts.

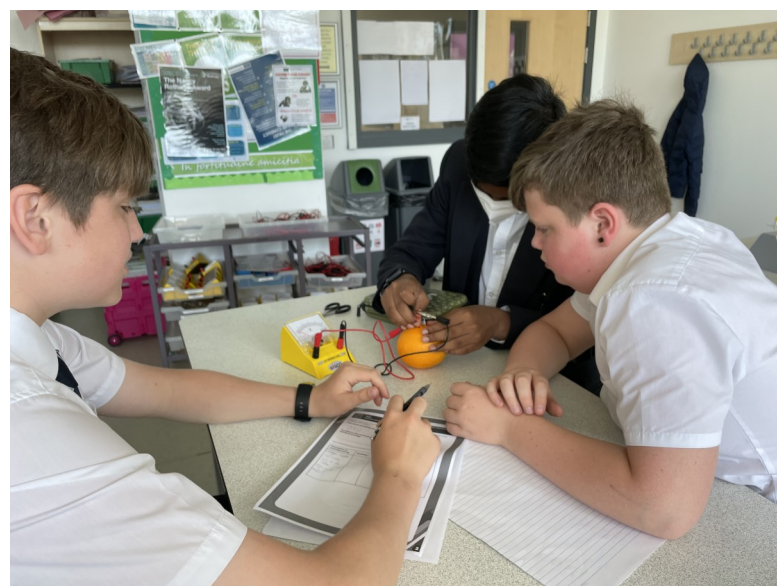
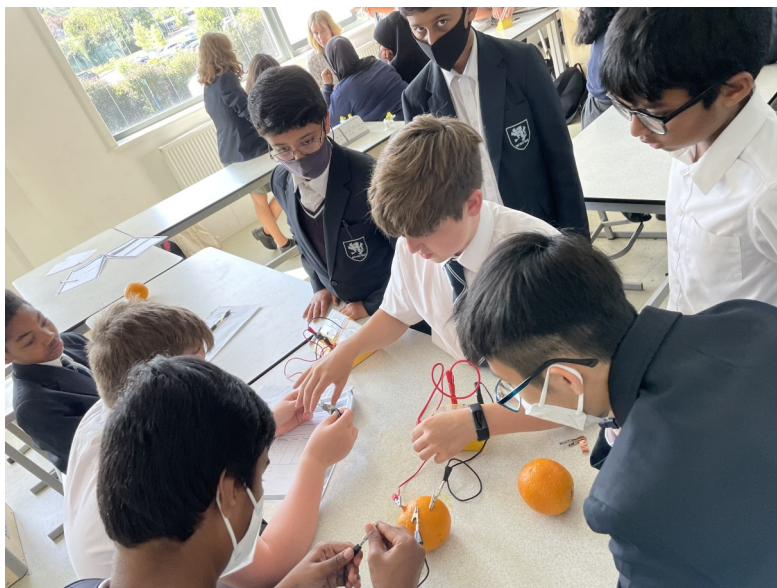

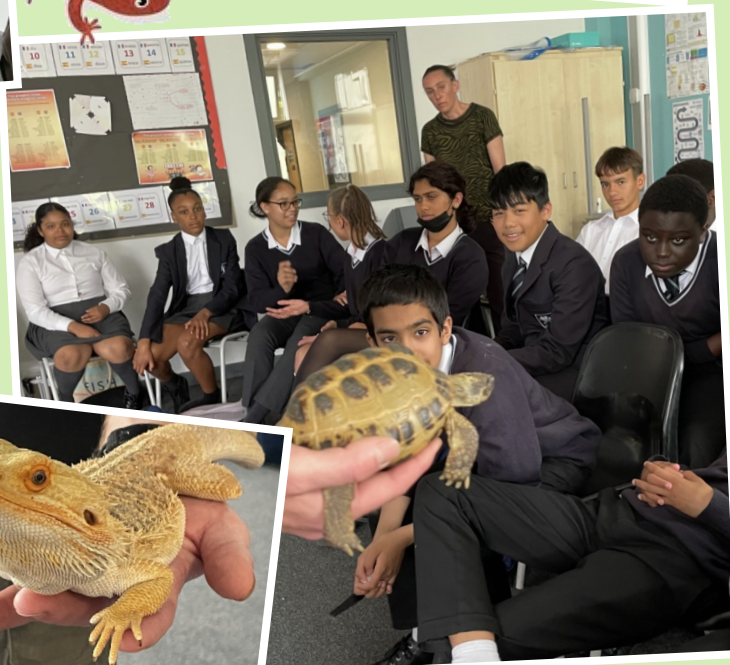
