### FROM THE HEADTEACHER



# Imperial College London Medical Summer School

### Imperial College London

Imperial College London Medical Summer School has been an experience I am not about to forget.

I travelled from Reading to London by train and went to the amphitheatre where we met the people in our groups as well as our mentors for the week.

Our mentors were medical students to whom we were free to ask any questions we had about medicine.

My group's mentor began some icebreakers to help us learn each other's names and we had an introductory talk as well as timetables for the week. We had lunch from the canteen with vouchers that our mentors distributed.

We had different talks throughout the week about the BMAT and UCAT exams as well as a taster of different careers in the medical field. Psychiatrists, doctors, paediatrics, dentists, physiologists as well as surgeons working in robotics came to visit us and kindly explained their jobs and how studying medicine didn't necessarily mean being a doctor, emphasizing that there were much better means of earning money than studying medicine.

We also had some practical activities like using an infrared camera, and naming bones in the body using skeletons.

We had some free time everyday in our accommodation, and evening activities after 8pm such as a film night, a pizza night and a board games night.

We had breakfast at 8am and were back to our accommodation for the night at

10pm with lights out at 11pm.

As it was a residential summer school, we each had a single en-suite room and we also had the choice of a single or mixed gender level.

The people coming were from diverse backgrounds and they all had an interest in medicine. People with prayer requirements were allowed to pray on time when they needed to and had a quiet space to all pray together.

The visitors also gave an insight into what studying at university would be like and encouraged us to get into it, but to consider that it would need a lot of hard work and dedication.

During the week we worked with the people in our groups on a case study, experiencing problem based learning (PBL) that is commonly used at ICL. The teachers encouraged us to make our own diagnostics based on symptoms. At the end of the week each group gave a presentation on their case study, using creative means such as a rap and a roleplay of a doctor with his patient.

Memti was also used to allow us to make suggestions and give our opinions and answers when asked questions.

Overall, this summer school was an unforgettable experience, and allowed me to meet very motivated and dedicated people.


# Year 10


Year 10 have had a strong start to the academic year with students focusing well on the year ahead.


### **Reading Ambassadors**



It has been an exciting and busy time in Food this term. All students have produced wonderful, creative practical work across all year groups.

### **Year 7: Food Technology**

Students have explored and experienced how to work in the food room focussing on hygiene and safety practices as well as

understanding how to use a range of unit equipment. For some, this has been an extremely new experience so well done on embracing the need to be part of a team.

The practical opportunities have included:

- Knife skills challenge carrot/ potato (bridge and claw technique)
- Sensory taste testing coleslaw

Next term, look forward to developing your practical skills in making pasta salad in a Jar, chicken nuggets and chicken/vegetable curry



Students continue to explore and experience how to work

hygienically and safely in the food room, using more specialist unit equipment. Everyone has been extremely enthusiastic working as a team, demonstrating a range of complex practical skills.




The practical opportunities have included:

- Making fresh pasta using the pasta machine, team work, cooking fresh pasta, combining with tomato sauce to create a one portion meal.
- Southern-style chicken and sweet potato wedges – using the oven, meat and vegetable preparation, using a meat probe, flavours and textures

Next term, look forward to making macaroni cheese and pasties.

# Year 9: GCSE Food Preparation & Nutrition – Edugas

This exciting course encourages students to learn about food in its widest sense as well as developing a wide range of food preparation skills. Students have shown a keen interest and are now starting to develop and demonstrate an individual flair for flavours, textures and overall presentation techniques.

Next term, students look forward to developing a range of sweet and savoury practical skill/outcomes linked to the theory and commodities content.





Every year on 26th September, we celebrate European Day of Languages. The aims of this celebration are:


- To alert the public to the importance of language learning, diversity and the range of languages learned in order to increase plurilingualism and intercultural understanding

Cultural heritage of students at

Maiden Erlegh School in Reading 2021-22

Every student was asked which nationalities they considered to be part of their cultural heritage. This might include the country of their birth, where they grew up and/ or family heritage. We then mapped this data to show the shared cultural heritage of our school.

Our Language is a key part of our culture – our identity. It defines us! 
