Important Information & Top Tips for GCSE Results Day



Anna Finlason Trust Careers Adviser 2022 Whether you are awaiting and preparing for GCSE Results Day, or the day has arrived, and you have received your results, this booklet is designed to help you navigate GCSE Results Day and beyond.

You will already have applied for Post 16 opportunities – which may have included one or more of the following main options – Sixth Form/s, F.E. College/s and/or an Apprenticeship/s.

Whether you are pleased, relieved, or disappointed with your GCSE results – please know that there will be an option for you. Please know it is still possible to achieve your goals, even if you might be taking a detour or discovering exciting new possibilities.

The following information is to help you, no matter your situation today.

Your immediate next steps...

- Check your grades against grades required (for conditional offers).
- Consider what you would like to do / what is an option for you now that you have received your GCSE grades.

If you achieved the required GCSE grades / have an unconditional offer, you can...

- Accept an existing offer from a school, college, or apprenticeship place do so today.
 OR
- 2) Potentially find an alternative option to your original plan / place contact alternative options today.

It is important you ACT TODAY!

If you did not quite meet the GCSE grades you needed, you can:

- 1) **Contact** the Sixth Form / college or apprenticeship employer to discuss the grades you achieved they may still be able to offer you a place.
- 2) Contact other Sixth Forms / colleges to see if they have any spaces for the subject/s you are interested in.

It is important you ACT TODAY!

****You will need to act quickly today** by contacting schools / colleges / apprenticeship employers.

You may be asked to attend face to face, telephone or apply online**

***Be prepared: take copies of GCSE results + a form/s of I.D. ***

It is important to have a place at school, college, on an apprenticeship or traineeship as your start Year 12.

Please note: this list is not an exhaustive list of schools within the area. Schools may also operate on a catchment area basis.

2) Vocational Courses: These are work-related courses delivered by colleges and are available at different levels, to suit your GCSE qualifications – ranging from creative to construction to computing to engineering to vehicle maintenance to media and many more subjects. Some colleges also offer A-levels or Applied Levels (a combination between coursework and exams). Entry requirements for level 3 courses such as BTEC (A Level equivalent) are usually GCSE grades 4 and 5 which is a bit lower than some schools/colleges for A-levels. You might also consider the level 2 courses which usually ask for grades 3 and above. Many courses are offered at all the local colleges.

3) Some subjects like catering, construction trades, animal care and horticulture are only offered at some of the colleges so, again, check all these details carefully. Popular courses may already have waiting lists.

- 4) **Apprenticeships -** Apprenticeships combine work with study for a qualification. You are paid a salary. You can find out more about apprenticeships and search for vacancies in your local area on the official government apprenticeship site: <u>https://www.findapprenticeship.service.gov.uk/apprenticeshipsearch</u>.

You can start an apprenticeship straight after GCSEs (Intermediate level and Advanced level, and sometimes even at Higher level – depending on your GCSE grades). Some apprenticeships can be followed all the way through to Higher/Degree level. You can search for apprenticeships using the website links below:

****It is strongly advised you keep your place at school or college / apply for college / sixth form if you do not yet have a confirmed place on an apprenticeship. You can take a one-year college course, and apply for apprenticeships while you are at college****

4) Traineeships

A traineeship is a course with work experience that gets you ready for work or an apprenticeship. It can last up to 6 months.

You can apply if you're:

- •eligible to work in England
- •unemployed and have little or no work experience
- •aged 16 to 24 and qualified below Level 3

Advice: It is best to start a college course / take a college course which lasts 1 year - if you have not already secured an apprenticeship / traineeship.

Specific Instructions from local Further Education Colleges can be found below:-

BCA, Maidenhead:



The following information and guidance have come directly from BCA: We are creating an Information Sheet for students who:

- Have already applied for college with details on how to enrol on chosen courses

 Students who have received a Conditional Offer from BCA will be invited to complete the online pre-enrolment via the BCA Enrolment App from the beginning of July 2022 and to book an appointment on the relevant day for their department to come in and complete their enrolment.
- 2. Are wishing to apply for a college course on GCSE Results Day Some of our courses may be full and have waiting lists by the time of GCSE day arrives, therefore, the only option is for a student to contact the college and ask to speak to someone in the relevant dept as to whether there are any vacancies on their chosen course.
- 3. Phone number to call on GCSE Results Day/following GCSE Results Day: Call BCA : 01628824444 or email BCA : <u>enquiries@bca.ac.uk</u>
- 4. Any documents students should bring for enrolment GCSE certificates/results and ID. Refer to the Joining Instruction pages on the college website for each department, for their specific requirements for Enrolment Day.
- 5. Specific area students should go within the college the Learning Centre for enrolment.
- 6. Any specific procedures for those who have a conditional/unconditional place and those who do not - Conditional place - complete the online enrolment process on the website Enrolment App and book an appointment to come into college to meet their tutor and complete their enrolment.

Henley College

The following information and guidance have come directly from Henley College:

- 1. Students who have already applied for Henley College will be sent a full enrolment handbook over the summer with everything they need to know about our enrolment process with details on how to enrol on chosen courses.
- 2. Those students who have already applied and accepted their conditional offer for the college will need to log into their application dashboard on GCSE results day and upload a copy of their Results Statements in order to enrol. We advise that all students who have not accepted their offer to do so before enrolment.
- 3. Students wishing to apply for a college course on GCSE Results Day.
- 4. Students who wish to apply on GCSE results can do so via our website. They will then be informed of the interview and enrolment process on receipt of their application
- 5. We shall have a GCSE advisory line which will go live on GCSE results day. The number for this will be: **01491 63 43 21**
- 6. Enrolment is all online, and students will need to log into their dashboard and upload their results here. As enrolment is an online process there should be no need to go to the college.
- 7. All students will need to enrol online.

Reading College and Bracknell & Wokingham College (Activate Learning)

The following information and guidance have come directly from the Central Advice and Admissions from Activate Learning colleges:

1. The phone number that the applicants can call regarding their GCSE results would be 0800 612 6008.

2. The documents that the students would be required to bring would be their GCSE results, proof of ID and sometimes the requested visa documents.

3. The applicants would not need to attend college to enrol onto the course as the enrolment form would be sent through email and we expect them to email us back with the completed enrolment form. The only other situation where they might need to come to college regarding their enrolment would be when we ask them to create and collect their physical ID card at the College. They can report to the reception for this and the receptionist would be able to guide them on where to go next.

4. The next steps for applicants who have accepted their conditional/unconditional offers would be to complete their enrolment form which would be sent out to them through their email after the 12th of August.

5. The next steps for applicants, who don't achieve the conditions to their offer, they would be contacted by the faculty to advise them on the next best suitable course for the applicant.

6. Applicants who are interested in applying to a course late, would have to go through our clearing courses that are available to them.
