FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Happy Half Term to one and all!

The first thirty-five days of the new school year has certainly been one to remember, and I suggest, one which we should all be very proud about. The first major "event" sent to try us was the Trust wide cyberattack and, whilst the fall out from this lingers on, the immediate impact of those first few weeks on students, and particularly on our staff, was hugely significant. With teaching resources, and data bases, inaccessible for many, staff showed tremendous fortitude, resilience, and creativity to ensure that our school continued to deliver high quality educational provision for our students. In a strange way, this experience, helped to galvanise the MER community; the need to collaborate, share resources and solutions to overcome the many challenges we faced, was really inspiring.

Then, just three weeks into the new term, the call came from Ofsted. Whilst we were expecting an inspection this academic year, the third week of term was a little unnerving, especially given our ongoing IT challenges, and the limited access to teaching and learning resources for staff and students. However, I'm delighted to say that the Ofsted team were very impressed with our school, and whilst the overall judgement can't yet be published while we wait for the final report to arrive, we were very pleased with the outcome and with the very positive feedback our school received. In fact, the Inspectors were at pains to say that they were incredulous at the quality of education at MER, given the challenges that we were facing! They also praised our students and their positive attitudes to learning, they acknowledged the strong relationships between staff and students and the culture of high aspiration

which permeated the school.

After the "Lord Mayor's Show," it

has been back to business as usual, with staff working relentlessly hard to continue to provide a high-quality curriculum and enrichment experience for our students. We've continued to strive to ensure we provide as many parent facing opportunities as possible this half term, with each Head of Year hosting well attended parent information evenings; our Open Evening at the end of September was a huge success and we had continued interest from prospective parents and children at our four open mornings this half term.

As well as a comprehensive extracurricular programme including a very popular weekly Debating club, we also ran a Year 11 visit to MES for the Careers Fare, the Harry Potter trip to Warner Brothers Studios in

Wembley, and hosted a Modern Foreign Languages Celebration during the Ofsted Inspection!

One of our key priorities for this year is school attendance, which has dipped in recent years,

since the Covid pandemic. I am pleased to say that the data after the first seven weeks of term is showing signs of positivity. I cannot stress enough the importance of children attending school every day. The impact of missing even the occasional day can be significant, we all want the best for our students and for your children, by making sure that they attend school regularly, we are supporting them to achieve and to succeed. Thank you for your continued support in encouraging good habits and in stressing the importance of getting into school each day.

This week we celebrate linguistic diversity and language learning


European Day of Languages 26 September


