As we near the end of a busy, eventful and productive first half of the spring term, it's time to reflect on what's been achieved over the past five weeks and what we have to look forward to when we return.


Our students have been their usual magnificent selves, working hard in class and supported so well by our dedicated and committed teachers and support staff. The Trust values of Aiming High, Working Together and Being Inclusive, underpin all that we do at MER, the support and encouragement offered by our staff, to each and every student, is second to none.

One plea that I would ask of our parents and carers is this; working hard in class is, of course, so important, but there are two other vital ingredients to ensuring that all our students aim high and achieve their potential. The first of these is attendance, having the occasional day off school really does have a negative impact on learning and achievement, as does taking holidays within term time. It is so important that we give our students every chance to succeed and being in school, every day, is the first and most important step towards that goal. Our whole school attendance currently stands at 91%, whilst this is an improvement on last academic year, we still have work to do to reach our target of 94% for this year. Secondly, working hard at home, to consolidate the learning done in school, is essential to achieving academic success. Homework is given for that reason; it will help to embed learning in the longterm memory and help to practise and master key skills.

Hard work and commitment really does pay off, our Year 11s have been magnificent this week; focused and motivated to do their very best in the first week of their PPE exams. 
